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1. Co-coordinators

Write a summary of all of the team reports for submission to the SIG Representative Liaison. These reports are all submitted into the record at the LD SIG's Annual General Meeting, which is held during the JALT international conference.

1. Achievements:

The Learner Development SIG continued to fulfill its obligations to its members by providing forums, both in print and in person, to discuss, research, and share various facets of learner development. Our role as coordinators has been to support the teams that are responsible for the different areas of the SIG, communicate with members, and represent the SIG and its members at JALT national executive meetings. We would like to highlight some of the SIG's major achievements from November 2015 to November 2016:

- Steadily growing membership and sustained personalized communication with SIG members (membership team)
- Avoided negative balance by reducing number/values of grants. Have been able to provide some support for unforeseen events, but austerity is needed. (treasury team)
- Grants awarded to members for two conferences, one research project, and one project, totaling 125,000 yen. (grants team)
- Published two regular issues of Learning Learning and one special issue, which featured 8 short papers from the 2015 LD Forum on "Learners as Teachers: What Teachers Learn From Their Learners" and the

2015 Creating Community: Learning Together 2 informal afternoon conference. (LL editorial team)

- Ordered two small print runs of publication projects: Learning Development Working Papers (80) and Looking Back: This Past Year after the Earthquake (35), delivered to project team members and sites in Rikuzentakata (publications team & former outreach team)
- Held forums at national conferences: JALT2016, PanSIG, and JALTCALL (programme team)
- Making progress on the first issue of the Learner Development Journal and a Review Network has been established. A theme, editors, and CFP have been announced for the second issue of LDJ. (Learner Development Journal Steering Group)
- Tokyo Get Together group met 7 times in 2016, and the group held their second Creating Community:
 Learning Together mini-conference for teachers and their students in December 2015. They are
 currently accepting proposals for their third CC:LT in December 2016 (Tokyo Get-Together organizing
 team)
- Kansai Get Togethers were successfully restarted, holding meetings monthly throughout the year, and the team held their first student conference in November 2016 (Kansai Get-Together organizing team)
- Hiroshima Get Together group met 5 times in 2016, and are currently preparing for their annual interuniversity Scrabble competition in December (Hiroshima Get-Together organizing team)
- Collaborated with other organizations inside and outside of JALT: sponsoring Hugh Nicoll at the Sojo
 University Teaching and Learning Forum (NanKyu Chapter) in Feb. 2017, developing a workshop on
 Goal-Setting and Learning Outcomes with FLP and the Nagoya chapter, and successfully bidding to host
 the Independent Learning Association's conference in August/September 2018.

2. Unresolved Challenges: (Agenda)

Budget priorities

How the SIG is financed by JALT has changed and we were quite generous with our funds in the past. We are encouraged by JALT to keep a "rainy day fund" equivalent to one year of our budget. We must rethink our grants, meanwhile we have requests for funding from GT groups and the PR team

Volunteers

We are in need of volunteers for both key roles and shadow positions, particularly for the coordinators, web team, and pub team.

Understanding Member Needs

Some team members have suggested a need to better understand what our members want from the SIG. Should a member survey be prioritized and who would design/implement it and analyze the results?

Attracting New Members

JALT members now get a free SIG, but we didn't experience a surge in membership. How do we attract new members?

Activities

Nagoya and FLP are eager to collaborate with LD on an event, but talks have stalled. The SIG will host ILA2018 and the conference committee will need our support.

3. Recommendations:

Improve communication

- O Mayumi and Mathew need to communicate with the teams better. We have started to hold monthly Skype meetings, but perhaps we should make our notes public or send a monthly summary of coordinator news to the list.
- O There needs to be more awareness of areas where teams interact (get-togethers, PR, web, grants, pubs, membership) and a greater attempt by team members to make sure that info is getting to the right people in time so it can get to our members.
- O Switch to Mail Chimp for announcements. ER SIG curently uses Mail Chimp for their newsletter (basically announcements). It's better for announcements as it allows for embedded media and collects open and click data. Do we need to look at how other SIGs communicate with members and encourage interaction?

Understanding Members' Needs

O Develop survey to be used with membership letters tailored for new, renewing, and departing members. Try to identify what our current strengths, successes, and weaknesses. Ask respondents to for permission to use opinions in PR material.

- We've developed a set of simple review guidelines for the RN that we agreed with Darren and Hugh. The RN has also reviewed the guidelines and approved them.

 with a thematic focus on Qualitative Research into Learner Development for the second issue. In May

Learning Development Working Papers A small print run of 80 copies was organised in October 2016. 80 copies @ 100,000JPY plus p&p costs. Priced @1500 JPY per copy in Japan, and @2000 JPY for overseas orders (so far, Ireland and Hong Kong). In the past the SIG has had trouble selling publications that have already been published online. This has led to a large surplus stock that has had to be shredded later. With 80 copies, the SIG

should not find it difficult to sell something like 75 copies and keep a few as display copies; printing and p&p costs should be more or less covered, too. Expected cost to the SIG: 15,000-20,000 JPY.

Looking Back: This Past Year after the Earthquake A small print run of 35 copies was organised in June 2016 priced @2500 JPY per copy for SIG members. This pricing allowed the SIG to donate 12 copies to different people and organisations in Rikuzentakata (including the school, Musashi-san, the local library, the tourist office, and Nakazawa Sensei). A copy was also sent to JALT Central Office for JALT's archives.

7. Web Team

- 1. **Achievements:** During the 2015/16 SIG year we have maintained our web presence, email list communications (both for officers and announcements for the general membership), and I have tried to post regular updates on our Facebook page.
 - The primary web site maintenance and support task for the SIG is publishing new issues of *Learning Learning*. A less demanding -- but more of a moving target challenge -- is regularly updating information pages. In the 2015-2016 year, by the time of the conference AGM in Nagoya, we will have published 3 issues; LL23(1), LL23(2), and LL23(3). I am pleased to now be working with Arnold Arao who stepped in as the *Learning Learning* layout coordinator.
 - Email communications -- both the LD-Comm (officers list) and the LD-News (announcements) mailing lists are hosted on the Id-sig.org domain, using the oldie but goodie mailing list software Mailman. Each month as web admin I receive membership updates, and try to keep both subscriber lists up-to-date. Occasionally minor problems -- lapsed email addresses, etc. -- have to be dealt with, but such issues can usually be dealt with quickly and easily. Maintaining the Facebook social media presence is also relatively simple and trouble-free, involving the posting of event and special publications announcements passed on by officers and friends.
- 2. Unresolved Challenges: There are three primary challenges to be addressed in the next year: (1) The development of a team of editors who will monitor and update web pages in consultation with other officer teams; (2) Developing a shadowing/skills development practice that will allow new members to take over in the near future; and (3) Re-booting the Talking Points Blog for the 2016-17 SIG year. In brief: bodies, brains, and commitment required.
 - I did get help from James and Billy in 2014 when we moved to Wordpress as a site platform, but for the most part all web site editing/updating is currently a solo effort, with the notable exception of the Grants team and Tokyo Get-togethers group, who mostly add and/or edit content on their own pages. Thanks and a shout out to Kris and Andy. Matthew has also stepped up from time to time to edit the messages from the coordinators and general welcome messages on the site.

The biggest challenge -- in addition to doing a better job of developing an active, collaborative team --

is in rebooting the Talking Points Blog, perhaps working more closely with the Publications Team members to integrate our respective areas of responsibility with the PR aspects of the maintaining the web site, Facebook presence, and publishing efforts. Institutional/personnel crises at my "home" university, combined with the personal challenges I have faced in moving from a tenured position to re-joining the ranks of the wage-slave part-timers proved more than I could manage during the first semester of the H. 28 academic year. Fingers crossed that we can hash out some options in the next month or two, hit the ground running in the new year.

- b) There were a very small number of applicants for each grant type this year. Why? Is it because the majority of our members receive institutional funding and are thus ineligible for most grants (except the project grant)? Or is it because 40,000 yen still would not cover the out of pocket expenses necessary to attend a conference for our members who do not receive institutional funding? Or some other reason? Is this an issue or not?
- c) For the past two years there have been zero inquiries/applications for the Subscription and Membership grants. Are these grants necessary?
- d) What to do if there are no applicants for a grant? Return this money to the SIG, or use it in subsequent cases where there are multiple applications to one grant category?

3. Recommendations:

- a) Should a survey be conducted to gauge the needs of members regarding grants?
- b) Stop offering the Subscription and Membership grants? Find some other method to attract

potential new members to the SIG?

1. Achievements

We have been trying a new approach with workshops and informal discussions for five out of the 7 gettogethers (including the CCLT conference) of the year. Feedback has been very positive, but participation has been variable from one get-together to another.

2. Unresolved challenges

It's really important to get timely membership updates so that we add new members as soon as possible to the Tokyo mailing list. Unfortunately there was a mix-up in the first half of the year and we missed contacting over 20 new members of the SIG until late July. For a couple of years now we have faced problems of continuity in terms of participation from one get-together to another. The core group of people making it to each get-together has become more variable, so there's been less of a sense of a need for research-oriented camaraderie. It could be that this is an unexpected effect of having the Creating Community Learning Together informal afternoon conference in December since 2014. Similarly, the launch of the Learner Development Journal may have shifted research impetuses outside of the meetings. Such factors may have changed the dynamic of the get-togethers, and the three of us are wondering whether (a) we should let CCLT go for a year (i.e., not hold it in 2017), and (b) it's worth having a complete break from the get-togethers for a year and then re-start in 2018 when Ken is back from sabbatical. This in part connects to the third challenge that we face finding a venue for the 2017 get-togethers. Perhaps all these challenges are pointing to the need to re-think everything together with Tokyo area members, survey them, and see what the different preferences and proposals people have for continuing.

3. Recommendations

It would be great if other people could step forward to act as get-together co-coordinators. Ken will be on sabbatical in 2017, and Blair will be more involved in LD SIG programmes. We need others to help coordinate the get-togethers. Perhaps we might stop the get-togethers for a year and then re-launch them in 2018, as mentioned above.

4. Items for the 2016-2017 budget

Estimated venue room costs for 2017: 25,000 yen. At Otsuma Women's University we pay a small amount for one room for several hours - about 2,500 each time; with CCLT3 room costs go up considerably, but we cover the increased costs through the 1,000 yen participation fee in December for teachers. CCLT breaks even. If we continue with the get-togethers in 2017 and the venue costs work out to be higher than 25,000 yen over the year, we can ask for donations from participating members as we have done in the past.

5. Goals for 2016-2017

The first is to enjoy what we do and learn as we go - we need to work out how to continue, adapt our expectations, and respond to the changing patterns of interest and activity that we have noted above. Ideally we would continue to develop as a teacher-researcher group committed to exploring together learner development issues. This might involve developing action research or Exploratory Practice projects together, combined with free-wheeling discussions of learner development practices and puzzles around people's interests. Another possibility is to develop a broad book, online, or multimodal project together, and/or work for a special issue of Learning Learning. We have the feeling that it would be helpful to have some kind of greater collaborative project, but we are as yet uncertain as to what that might be. CCLT4 at this point remains a question mark.

6. Team members/roles for November 2016 to November 2017

At the time of writing this (late October) it looks likely that in 2017 Blair will be less involved in coordinating the Tokyo get-togethers and more involved in LD programmes. Ken will be definitely be away on sabbatical. Andy will continue, but it would be really appreciated if one or two new people could step forward to co-coordinate in 2017.

B. Hiroshima Get-Togethers

1. Achievements:

We're still going! And it's still worthwhile. In 2016, we have met in March, July, September, and plan to meet in November and December. The annual Scrabble contest gives us a good end-of-year focus, and as we look forward to becoming more involved in a publication-related project, we hope that this will also give us an opportunity to work together in various ways. It's been good working with Ariel Sorensen, while he was in Hiroshima. 1. Achievements:

Kansai Get-Togethers restarted in November 2015 and subsequent monthly meetings have been well attended by Kansai area language instructors.
